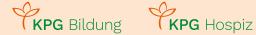

Understanding the end of the road

Providing first aid in daily life is a matter of course. After all, it is about saving lives. However, how can we help people whose lives can no longer be saved, those who are dying?

A situation that makes us feel insecure or helpless. It is difficult to accept death as part of life. Most of the time, the passing away takes place behind closed doors, and our experience of caring for the dying has been a lost cause – also in the fields of nursing and medicine.

Yet so much can be done with so little. Accompanying people in the dying process means above all giving them attention, because that is what they need the most.

In our LETZTE:HILFE:IN:BERLIN-course, amateurs can learn in just a few hours what they can do for others at the end of life.



Useful information

Caring for people at the end of life is not rocket science. It is about compassionate care, recognising signs of passing life and soothing symptoms.

It is important to know what to do - a little massage, listening to favourite music or praying together can also help.

Interested people learn where and how to get professional help and support, how to organise the time of solemnity and grieving, and which funeral forms and options are available.

Course content

We the knowledge that is necessary to be able to dying people without fear and uncertainty.

The LETZTE·HILFE·IN·BERLIN-course focuses on:

- Fatality as a part of life
- Provision and decision-making
- Physical, psychological, social and existential needs
- Bidding farewell to life

We know how to go about it

Since 2017, we have been offering the LETZTE·HIL-FE-IN-BERLIN-course. The aim is to train as many Berliners as possible not to look away when confronted with the topic of death, but to be there for others and to stand by them.

We are the staff of the Kompetenzzentrum Palliative Geriatrie (KPG) at the Unionhilfswerk. Supported by trained volunteers, we are at deathbeds in our daily practice, at home, in hospital or in nursing homes.

We offer advice on living wills, the culture of solemnity and train full-time and voluntary staff. For years, we have been committed to good care and medicine under our motto "Take heart to live ably and die gracefully".

Many of our activities are funded by the Unionhilfswerk-Förderstiftung.
